

CONSERVATION NOTES

A topic of discussion in recent meetings was how to involve residents more in making use of our conservation areas. In particular, we consider them as a tool for educating our youth on nature and the importance of conservation for future generations. The most recent edition of Forest Notes (the publication of The Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests) features articles devoted to this theme of encouraging youth to take advantage of Conservation Easements throughout the state. My personal experiences with my grandson remind me of how rewarding time spent exploring our outdoors can be. From the time he could walk and talk, the first thing he would say when he came up for a visit was, "Grandpa, let's look for animals." Initially, this was turning over every rock and log. He loved to count the salamanders and insisted on touching everything from worms to insects. One particularly fortunate morning a few years back, we found a bull moose browsing in a logged area off of Pig Lane. It's hard to say who was more excited. Now that he is nearly six, we take longer walks on the Isinglass River Conservation Reserve, and he is fascinated by the beavers and their lodges on the pond and the rushing water at the old Swains Mill. I recall while growing up in Dover a man who grew up here would always refer to Strafford as "God's Country." That always stuck with me. Since moving here in 1986 I have learned what he meant. Teachers at our elementary school might have an interest in day trips with their classes for hiking or exploration and are welcome to speak to us for more information on our conservation lands. The

Boy Scouts have a long-standing appreciation of our outdoors, and individuals have made valuable contributions with kiosks, trail maintenance, and construction of bat houses at the Town Forest. The next meeting of the Conservation Commission is at 7 PM on April 2 at the Town Hall.

NOTES FROM THE TOWN CLERK

By the time you read this, the snow may have finally stopped falling for the winter...may have. Thanks to those of you who braved an Election Day snowstorm for the second year in a row—trudging through slush and snow to cast your votes. Over 600 of you voted which is higher than average for a Town Meeting. After the Election Day Blizzard of 2017, there was movement at the State level to address the fact that there was no authority in New Hampshire to postpone elections. As it stands now, only the Secretary of State has that authority, and he chose not to exercise it this year. Stay tuned for more on this in the future.

Our regular business hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 8:30 am to 2 pm and Tuesday from 1 to 7 pm.

Please license all dogs by April 30—a reminder that all dogs 4 months and older must be licensed each year between January 1 and April 30. Avoid late fees. See below for details on licensing your dog online.

The Town Hall (including the Town Clerk's Office) will be closed on the following days in May, June, and July: Monday, May 28, 2018 - Memorial Day; and Wednesday, July 4, 2018 -Independence Day.

Online Vehicle Renewals & Dog Licensing—For your convenience, you can renew your vehicle registrations and license your dogs with the Strafford Town Clerk online. process your online renewals and mail your registrations/licenses to you. It's easy and convenient. There are extra fees associated with online transactions, which are explained during the online process. Only renewals can be processed online; allow one week for processing; all new vehicles, vehicle transfers, and new dogs must be processed in person at the Town Clerk's office.

OHRV, FISHING & HUNTING LICENSES NEWS FLASH

Effective May 1, 2018, the fee for annual and 14-month wheeled vehicle registrations will increase by \$30.00 for anyone who is not a member of a New Hampshire off-highway recreational vehicle (OHRV). To receive the discounted member rate, you must show valid proof of current membership in a NH wheeled vehicle club of New Hampshire Off-Highway Vehicle Association (NHOHVA). Purchase your Hunting and Fishing License and register you OHRVs and Snowmobiles at the Tax Collector's Office in Town Hall. Snowmobiling may be over but not the fun times out of doors. If you have not yet registered those OHRV's, dirt bikes, three- and four-wheelers, Getter Done. If they were not registered in the past two years, you will need to know all the information about it, including the VIN #, color, CCs, etc. Maybe you have an older registration you could bring with you that has the needed information.

Fishing season, saltwater and freshwater, is here; get those licenses at Town Hall, too. Your 2018 Digest "Law Books" are available at the Town Hall.

2017 NH "Moose Hunt Lottery" information and applications are available online. The last day to apply is May 25, 2018. Cost to apply is \$15.00. To purchase your Hunting license, you need your expired Hunting license or a copy of your "Hunter Safety Course Certificate" or "Archery Education Certificate."

Spring Turkey season is scheduled for May 3 thru May 31, 2018; make sure your license is updated. Licenses and

Registrations are available to purchase any time the Tax Collector is in the building.



READY RIDES

Ready Rides is a non-profit organization formed to provide rides for seniors and physically challenged neighbors in Barrington, Durham, Lee, Madbury, Newmarket, Northwood, Nottingham, and Strafford who need transportation to medical and dental appointments. We recently added Newfields and are looking at other nearby towns to expand this service.

For our last fiscal year ending 9-30-17, Ready Rides completed 2,711 trips and drove almost 68,000 miles for those needing rides. For Strafford, that included 32 residents who used our service for a total of 309 trips. Although Strafford has 13 vetted drivers, those 309 trips were completed by many drivers from our 8 other surrounding towns. Although we don't guarantee that every request will be fulfilled, for this past year we were able to complete 98% of the Strafford trips that were requested.

The success of our program depends on our volunteer drivers. We are always looking for new drivers. Our program works around your schedule and availability; you can do as many or as few rides as you want. Drivers select rides from a list of requested trips to match a driver to a rider. We offer training programs for new drivers and mileage reimbursement. STATE HOUSE UPDATE

This is the State House update from one of your State Representatives, Mike Harrington. I am writing this in the middle of the 3/13 snowstorm. I hope by the time you are reading this it looks more like spring.

At the State House we are approaching Crossover Day (3/22) which is the last day to act on all House Bills. Bills can be passed and sent to the Senate (Ought to Pass or OTP), defeated (Inappropriate to Legislate or ITL) Tabled (another word for defeated) or sent to study (which in the second year of a session usually means defeated). After 3/22 the House will begin reviewing bills passed by the Senate and the Senate the same with those passed by the House. The session is scheduled to end on 5/24.

The Senate has passed an extension of the expanded Medicaid Program that is scheduled to expire at the end of the year. It proposes using profits from the State Liquor Stores to fund the state portion of this program. This bill will now come to the House where it will require at least two positive House votes to pass. This is because bills like this, which spend large amounts of money, first go to a policy committee that provides a recommendation (e.g. OTP, ITL) and then sends it to the House. If the House votes OTP, it will be sent to the Finance Committee to determine how it is going to be paid for and how it fits into the existing budget. They, in turn, will provide a recommendation (they may or may not amend the bill) and send it back to the House for another vote. So you can see there is still a long way to go on this bill.

Another issue with major financial impact is the Family Leave Bill. This bill would establish a new State department of about 45 people to administer a family leave program that would allow employees to take multiple weeks off from work and still receive 60% of their pay for qualifying events. The program would be like ones in other states in that it would be voluntary. Those who choose to join would pay a small percentage of their salary into a fund. The problem is, if it is voluntary, those most likely to use the benefit are the ones who will sign up for the program. This leaves the potential for the state to be libel for making the payments if enough folks who do not plan on using the benefits do not sign up for the program. This bill is now in Finance, and it appears some major changes are being proposed.

As a reminder, you can see how I or any other Sate Rep or Senator voted on any roll call votes at http://www.gencourt.state.nh.us/. Remember, the vote is based on the committee's recommendation. For example, if the committee recommendation is ITL on a bill I think ought to pass, I would vote no that is against the committee recommendation. If the no's win, a motion would be made that the bill ought to pass and I would vote yes on that

On a more local issue, we just had our School District Meeting which approved spending of over \$10 million. There are over 3,200 registered voters in Strafford, and only 178 showed up for this Saturday morning meeting. For many folks in Strafford, their property tax is the largest amount of taxes they pay. You can make a difference by showing up. As little as 50 additional folks showing up could have changed the

outcomes of the three secret ballots.

As always, feel free to contact me on any state issue. I do have to ask one favor and also offer an apology. I have always said I would get back to Strafford residents who contact me, but I am sure I have missed a few. The amount of emails I receive is now in the hundreds per week. At least 90% of these are from people not in my district; many are from folks outside of NH. It has become impossible just to open them all to determine where the sender is from. For this reason, I ask that you put "Strafford Resident" as the subject of the email. I will do my best to open, read, and respond to all emails with this in the subject line.
