#### DO YOU KNOW WHERE YOUR TRASH IS?



#### **TOPS**





#### FROM THE STRAFFORD SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board would like to remind everyone of the very important upcoming meetings. The School District Budget Hearing will be held at the school on Wednesday, February 8, at 5:30 pm (snow day Thursday, February 9, same time). We moved the start time up to help with people who do not want to be out late on a winter night. This is the meeting where the upcoming budget is presented and discussed, line by line. We will also go over any warrants that will be voted on. The School budget is approximately 10x the Town budget, so being an informed voter is extremely important. This budget will be voted on at the School District Meeting scheduled for Saturday, March 11, at 9:00 am at the School (snow day Wednesday, March 15, at 6 pm). The Board moved this meeting to a Saturday at the request of voters, so we hope to have a great turnout. There are many people on the School Board, School Administration, and SAU who do a lot of work to put this together, and I can't stress enough the importance of understanding where your tax dollars are spent. Please make the time to attend these two district meetings.



#### STATE HOUSE UPDATE

Happy New Year. My name is Mike Harrington, and I am one of your State Representatives representing New Durham and Strafford. This is my first "State House Update" which is a non-partisan update on what is going on in Concord and will be provided on a periodic basis.

The House first met in December on what is called Organization Day. On this day, all the Reps were sworn in, and the Speaker of the House was elected. Shawn Jasper, the former Speaker was re-elected. The next business was assigning all 400 Reps their committee assignments (I will be on the Election Law Committee), naming Chairs and Vice Chairs, and presenting the House and Senate with the results of the Governor's and Executive Council elections. Also during this time, the Reps develop Legislative Service Requests (LSRs). The LSRs will become the basis for proposed new legislation. All LSRs need to be signed off by their sponsors by 1/6. The various committees will all have organizational meetings in the middle of January, after which the LSRs, by then bills, will be sent to the appropriate committees.

The first major issue will be House Bill (HB) 1, which is the budget. NH has a biannual budget, and the new one must be approved before the existing one expires at the end of June. As you might expect, this is usually a contentious issue. I will keep you updated on the progress on the budget as it moves through the development and approval process. You can keep track of all the LSRs, bills and how Reps vote at http://www.gencourt.state.nh.us/

One area where there always is confusion is what is actually being voted on. The House votes on what the applicable committee has recommended for a bill. Usually the committee recommends either "Ought to Pass" (OTP) or "Inappropriate to Legislate" (ITL). An example shows where the confusion comes from. Let's suppose there is a bill that states NH is not the best state in New England to live. The committee recommendation is ITL. Most Reps would vote yes but not yes that they are in favor of what the bill says but yes they agree with the committee that the bill is Inappropriate to Legislate. So a yes vote is a vote against the bill. If you are going to check to see who voted for what, you must know what the committee recommendation was first.


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#### STRAFFORD TOWN DEMOCRATIC COMMITTEE

#### STRAFFORD TOWN REPUBLICANS


At the January Strafford Town Republican Committee Round Table, State Senator John Reagan and Representative Kurt Wuelper joined us. Allodial rights are being considered in a pending bill. This is an interesting topic that has to do with property and rights thereto of the owner and what interests the State may or may not have. Senator Reagan is a sponsor of the Right to Work bill which is getting a lot of press. Electric power rates came up with regards to employment since Sig Sauer and Lindt have expressly cited high electric rates as reason for not expanding.

Kerry McMahon, candidate for School Board, has attended School Board meetings for the last year and has been doing research on Kindergarten with various districts around the State. Kerry also has been working up proposals to help improve discovered weak areas of student achievement.

We also touched on Town Planning/Zoning and a proposal to set ordinance language to work with recent State-wide mandated allowance of accessory dwelling units on each lot.

#### **CONSERVATION NOTES**

Conservation Commission members are very pleased to see cars parked at both the Town Forest on Parker Mountain Road and at the Isinglass River Conservation Reserve this winter. We had a long discussion about whether to pay for having both sites plowed, and it is good to know that people are enjoying both properties during the snowy months. We are thankful to Rick Hodges who clears the parking area by the Spencer Smith trail as a gift to the Town. Trail maps for both the Isinglass River Conservation Reserve (IRCR) and the Town Forest are available on the Town website. Click on Conservation Commission and find the maps below the list of Commission members.

Commission members spent a great deal of time this year working on Evans Mountain to plan a trail that will connect with the Spencer Smith trail on the Town Forest. We worked with George Lovejoy because the trail will cross the Blue Hills Foundation of the Evans Mountain conservation properties as well as the Strafford portion. We also needed to work with Bear-Paw to make sure any trail did not damage fragile habitats such as vernal pools or lichen covered bald rocks along the ridges. By autumn, a trail corridor approved by Bear-Paw had been planned, but still needed review by the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) and the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP), both of which gave large grants to enable us to purchase and conserve those 1000 acres up there. They each have that investment to make sure we are protecting the very habitats they supported with their dollars. We look forward to those approvals and the opportunity to complete the long-awaited connecting trail this spring and summer.

Bear-Paw is offering two hikes to the public in February. The first is Saturday morning, February 11, at 9:30 am over on Strafford's IRCR trails as part of the "One Step at a Time" discovery series of Bear-Paw conservation easement properties or preserves. Later in the month on Saturday afternoon, February 25, starting at 1:00 pm, Frank Mitchell will lead a group on Deerfield's Wells Town Forest. Deerfield recently protected all of its town forest tracts with Bear-Paw easements. The Wells Town Forest is a bit harder to find than some of the others, so it will be good to have Frank with all of his naturalist skills to lead us.

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
