BOW LAKE BEACH – 2017 SEASON June 18 to August 12, 2017

Lifeguards will be on duty at the beach area, weather permitting, Monday through Saturday from 10:00 am to 4:30 pm and on Sunday from 11:00 am to 4:30 pm.

Year-round residents and property owners who are seasonal residents may pick up a pass from the beach attendants during normal operating hours. Please present an ID or proof of property ownership (a tax bill) to obtain a beach pass. Visitors may purchase a pass for the day or for the 2017 Summer Season from beach attendants during normal operating hours. Day pass for an individual or family is \$5.00; no charge for children under 12 accompanied by an adult; season pass for an individual is \$25.00; season pass for a family is \$50.00.

Swimming lessons—Session 1 is June 26 through July 7; no lessons on July 3 or 4. Session 2 is July 31 through August 11. Registration is required. Registration forms will be available at the beach, at Town Hall, and at www.strafford.nh.gov.

DOUBLE FEATURE ART SHOW/BOOK SALE


Come one, come all to the Hill Library Book Sale sponsored by Friends of Hill Library! That book you haven't read? Maybe it's for sale on August 12.

BEAR-PAW NEWS

There are several ways to have fun outdoors with Bear-Paw in June. Start on Thursday evening, June 8, from 6 to 8 pm over at the TL Storer Boy Scout Reservation with Russ Cohen, author of *Wild Foods I Have Known...and Eaten*. Even if you've trekked with him before, a different trail will yield different wild foods to discover.

On Saturday, June 17, from 7 am to noon, Mark West and Frank Mitchell invite you to join them for a Bear-Paw Biothon species treasure hunt on the Dearborn Forest in Raymond. There will be a hunt in the forest and also on Onway Lake by kayak or canoe.

On Wednesday, June 28, we explore the Freese Town Forest in Deerfield starting at 9:30. This is a good test of our map and compass skills on a 174-acre tract with no trails!

CONSERVATION NOTES

Summer is upon us, and many people will be out enjoying our conservation trails. Remember, they pass through the habitat of our treasured flora and fauna. Please be mindful and respectful of signs and adhere to policy of carrying out anything you carry in. Dogs should be leashed, and trails are for foot

travel only. No fires please and avoid parking in front of gates, which could impede access. Thanks for cooperating with these steps to insure the natural beauty for years to come.

As you travel the roads you will perchance encounter a turtle attempting a crossing. It only takes a minute to stop and render assistance, either by watching for traffic until they safely cross or by picking the turtle up and depositing it on the side in which it is heading. Doing this with snapping turtles is for the bold-hearted. However, if you grasp them firmly by the sides of their shell, the impressive jaws cannot reach you. Other species you may encounter are painted, spotted, Blandings, and wood turtles. If you see a turtle in the sand on the roadside leave it! It is laying eggs. Speaking of other slow-moving animals, opossums are more and more common in the area. It was not that long ago they were rare or nonexistent this far north. These fascinating animals are our only marsupials. Despite their impressive snout and teeth they are actually quite timid. They will eat just about anything and are thought to be highly resistant to rabies infection.

The bald eagles have chosen a different tree for their nest on Bow Lake's Bennett Island this year, and at least one eaglet has hatched. Volunteers are monitoring loon behavior. In Caswell Cove there was a territorial take over last year by a male from the Kooaukee territory. Should be interesting to see what develops.

The Conservation Commission welcomes new member Katrina Amaral who will be a valuable addition.





BENNETT ISLAND FOREVER CAMPAIGN

The Thomas Haas Fund of the New Hampshire Charitable Foundation (NHCF) has issued Bear-Paw Regional Greenways a challenge: Raise another \$20,000 in contributions for the Bennett Island Forever Campaign and the Thomas Haas Fund will match it! Daniel Kern, Bear-Paw's Executive Director, recently reported, "We are excited to meet the challenge. We have already raised \$100,000 and are halfway to the purchase price; however, we need to raise a little more than another \$100,000 to complete the project. This challenge will match the next \$20,000 in private gifts with another \$20,000. That will make a big difference. It's huge!"

The \$100,000 already raised includes \$60,000 in private contributions, a \$30,000 pledge from the Strafford Conservation Commission, and a \$10,000 grant from the Davis Conservation Foundation. There are also other grant applications outstanding but no commitments yet. The conservation easement to preserve the island was appraised at \$700,000, but Bear-Paw has the opportunity to purchase it for just \$200,000. "So if you were waiting for a good opportunity to give to the Bennett Island Forever Campaign, do it now. We need donations from everyone who cares deeply about Bow Lake and the wildlife and people who call it home. Everyone who makes a gift of \$250 or more receives a "Bennett Island" Flamingo to display on their lawn to show their support for this important project. If you make a gift of \$1,000 or more, you will get the prized Golden Flamingo of Bow Lake to show your commitment to the campaign."

"Bear-Paw is also looking for more people to lead the Bennett Island Forever campaign, and we are planning a round of fundraising parties on the Lake this spring and summer. If you would like to help host one, please contact Daniel Kern at the Bear-Paw office (603.463.9400 or info@bear-paw.org)."

Undeveloped islands are a rare natural resource in the eleven-town Bear-Paw region and on Bow Lake. Located in Strafford and Northwood, the Lake is part of the coastal watershed and is home to a wide variety of wildlife, including a pair of breeding Bald Eagles that live on Bennett Island and Common Loons that nest on and around it. Few people visit Bow Lake without taking a lap around Bennett Island to see the eagles and loons. The lake is also a popular spot for fishing, swimming, and boating.

Bear-Paw Regional Greenways is a non-profit land trust with a mission to conserve a network of lands that permanently protects the region's water, wildlife habitat, forests, and farmland. Bear-Paw now holds easements or land protecting 65 properties and more than 8,177 acres. Established by resident volunteers, Bear-Paw works to conserve open space in Allenstown, Barnstead, Candia, Deerfield, Epsom, Hooksett, Northwood, Nottingham, Pittsfield, Raymond, and Strafford through outreach, education, and the completion of land protection projects. Be sure to look around Town and notice the gardens and barrels full of colorful flowers that have been planted by Garden Club members. Also, be sure to look for our dedicated crew at work in Gwen's Garden (previously known as the Dam Garden). It will be our pride and joy.

STRAFFORD TOWN REPUBLICANS

At the May Round Table of the Strafford Town Republican Committee Senator John Reagan, Representative Kurt Wuelper, and Representative Mike Harrington joined us. We discussed SB 3 that seeks to provide better honesty in voting. Although there has been a hopeful investigation by the City of Dover into same-day registrants turning out valid, there are still local reports that are troubling, including 20 people claiming to live in Bear Brook State Park who all voted just before the closing of polls in Deerfield. The Secretary of State is working on a statewide database that will interface with surrounding states.

A number of energy topics were discussed including how bad an organization FERC is. The Federal Energy Regulation Commission offers no safeguards for cost increases during construction to protect consumers. What should clearly be risk of stockholders and investors is passed on to ratepayers with no effort to keep costs to bid.

We also discussed how Accessory Dwelling Unit requirements are going to be interpreted with regards to existing, non-conforming buildings and lots. The state budget and how receipts are coming in higher than expected were also touched on.



HIGHER ELECTRIC RATES

You may think there is nothing you can do but there is. Eversource (aka PSNH) is going to raise the rates they charge for the energy supply portion of your electric bill. They are already much higher than the competitive suppliers, and they are going up. So what does one do? Go to http://www.puc. nh.gov/Consumer/Choosing%20an%20Energy%20Supplier. html. This is the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission website. (I am a former Commissioner.). It will provide a list of competitive electric suppliers that have registered with them. Not having looked at all the suppliers, I do not know all their rates, but I can assure you there will be many that will provide your energy portion of your bill for less than Eversource. How much? \$20 to \$45 (and maybe more) a month depending on how much electricity you use. Summer is coming; if you have central air conditioning or window units, a pool or a hot tub, your electric usage is going to go up in June, July, and August.

Many people ask me these questions: What about my bill? One bill from Eversource just like you would have if you bought your energy supply from them. What if I have an electric outage? The very well qualified line workers at Eversource (again, I say this as a former PUC Commissioner) are top shelf and do not know who you are buying your electric supply from. Even if they did, they have to provide the same service to all customers.

NOTES FROM THE TOWN CLERK

On-Line Vehicle Renewals & Dog Licensing—Avoid late fees; license your dog by May 31. You can renew your vehicle and boat registrations and license your dogs with the Strafford Town Clerk online. Just follow the instructions on the renewal letters we send or go to www.strafford.nh.gov (our Town website) and locate the red "Online Payments" button. The Strafford Town Clerk will process your online renewals and mail your registrations/licenses to you. It's easy and convenient. Only renewals can be processed online; allow one week for processing; all new vehicles, new boats, vehicle transfers, and new dogs must continue to be processed in person at the Town Clerk's office.

REAL ID Information—On January 3, 2017, the New Hampshire DMV began offering Driver Licenses and Non-Driver Identification Cards that are compliant with Federal requirements, also referred to as REAL ID compliant identification. You are not required to obtain REAL ID compliant identification since other forms of identification, such as a Passport, will be accepted for domestic air travel and for other Federal purposes, such as entering secure Federal facilities until 10/1/2020. For those of you who wish to obtain a REAL ID, you will be required to provide several forms of identification including a birth certificate (certified or original) or your valid unexpired US Passport or Passport Card. Certified vital records available at the Clerk's office include the following: Birth records from 1935 to present (except 1949 and 1950); death records from 1965 to present; marriage records from 1960 to present; divorce records from 1979 to present.

OHRV's FISHING & HUNTING LICENSE

Purchase your Hunting & Fishing License and register you OHRV at the Tax Collector's Office. To purchase your Hunting License, you need your expired Hunting License OR a copy of your "Hunter Safety Course Certificate".

Trout Ponds—Open season is from the fourth Saturday in April (April 22) thru October 15. Daily limit is five (5) fish or five pounds, whichever limit is reached first.

Black Bass (Smallmouth Bass & Largemouth Bass)—May 15 to June 15, catch and release ONLY; July 1 to December 31, five (5) fish daily, no length limit.

Get your "Hunter Safety Course" early. Info at huntnh.com or call 603-536-1290.

If you didn't register that OHRV last year, do the 14-month registration available now—it will expire 06/30/2018. You can still register OHRV's for 2017, but it will expire 06/30/2017.

Mud Season is still here; get your OHRVs, dirt bikes, three- or four- wheelers and snowmobile registration at the Tax Collector's Office. You must be at least 18 years of age to register any OHRV or snowmobile. All registrants must have a valid driver's license. If you have not registered it in the past two years, you will need to know all the information about it (including the VIN #). Did you know that most of your registration fee goes to "Trail Maintenance"? Approximately 82% of snowmobile registration fee and 59% of OHRV's goes for trail maintenance of the "Trail System."

You can purchase licenses and registrations on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8:30 to 2, and on Tuesday from 1 to 6, or any time the Tax Collector is at the office.
