Please remember to attend the School District Meeting on Saturday, March 11, 2017, at 9 am in the School gym. This is the meeting where the Board presents the School budget to be voted on by the Town. There is also a petition warrant to bring full-day kindergarten to the district. The new budget is over ten and a half million dollars and is a significant part of our tax rate. Almost 60% of that is employee pay and benefits. The Board needs everyone to take the time to come to the meeting to better understand where our tax dollars go. It is the only way we can ensure the work we do is what the voters want. This meeting was changed to a Saturday this year in the hopes of getting greater voter participation. Again, please make time for this very important meeting.

Online Vehicle Renewals & Dog Licensing—For your convenience, you may renew your vehicle registration and dog license online. Simply follow the instructions on the renewal letters we send OR go to www.strafford.nh.gov and click the red "Online Payments" button. The Strafford Town Clerk will process your online renewals and mail your registrations/licenses to you. It's easy and convenient. There are extra fees associated with online transactions which are explained during the online process. Only renewals can be processed online; allow one week for processing; all new vehicles, vehicle transfers, and new dogs must be processed in person at the Town Clerk's office.

Dates to remember: March 14—Town Election at the Town Hall which is open for voting only. Polls open at 8 am and close at 7 pm. March 18—Town Meeting at the Strafford School Gym beginning at 8:30 am.

Voter Registration: Residents can register to vote with the Strafford Town Clerk during regular business hours on or before Thursday, March 2, 2017. Last day to register to vote prior to the Town Election is Saturday, March 4. The Supervisors of the Checklist will be available between 11 and 11:30 that day at the Town Hall. New voters may also register on Election Day, March 14. Please see the Voter Registration tab on the Town website for instructions. Please note that if you have not registered to vote on or before Town Election Day, March 14, you will not be eligible to vote at Town Meeting or School District Meeting. Absentee ballots for both Town and School elections are available for eligible voters; please see the Absentee Ballot tab on the Town website for instructions.

No additions or corrections shall be made to the Checklist after this session until Town Election Day, March 14, 2017, except as provided in RSA 659:12; 654:8, II.

FROM THE PLANNING BOARD

Last year the NH Legislature enacted a bill that requires towns to allow the construction of Accessory Dwelling Units as part of single family residential use beginning on June 1 of this year. At the same time, the Legislature also recognized that each community is different, so the legislation allows towns to draft regulations to tailor the new units to fit each community's unique circumstances. Your Planning Board and Board of Adjustment members have worked together to come up with a Strafford regulation for these Accessory Dwelling Units. An Accessory Dwelling Unit is a separate unit attached to a house through an interior door. Accessory Dwelling Units are meant to offer families a chance to provide an affordable solution to the problem of housing elderly parents or grown children by allowing the construction of a separate space attached to the main house. After deliberation, Board members agreed that in a rural community such as Strafford, it would make sense to allow the development of detached units as well. Board members have worked hard to craft an ordinance that will work for Strafford while also meeting State requirements.

Another proposal on the ballot is to add agrotourism to the list of allowed land uses. Agrotourism is the development of business ventures based on a farm, such as hosting events in the barn, hayrides, petting zoos, or conducting farm tours. Adding agrotourism to the list of allowed uses is the natural extension of our agricultural/residential zoning and Strafford's long history of allowing home occupations. Farm owners would work with the Planning Board to make sure that health and safety concerns, traffic, etc. are addressed.

Finally, there are proposals adding a paragraph to try to improve the Town's ability to enforce ordinances and codes, and a proposal to require setbacks from roof edges for the increasingly popular photovoltaic solar arrays in order to allow firefighter access in case of an emergency.

Zoning and Building Regulations proposals are voted on the paper ballots on Tuesday, March 14, 2017. If you have any questions about these proposals, we urge you to contact any member of the Planning Board or phone the Planning & Zoning office at 664-2192, ext. 105, email eevans.strafford.nh@gmail.com. Planning Board members have committed to making themselves available on Election Day to answer any questions you might have about the zoning proposals before you vote. Thank you for supporting our efforts to improve our community.

CONSERVATION NOTES

As we turn the corner into spring through March, it is time to think of maintenance activities on our Town conservation lands, and the Conservation Commission will welcome volunteers to help with several activities. (1) On the steep portion of the popular Spencer Smith trail there is always the need to keep the water bars clear of the autumn and winter's accumulation of debris. (2) In May we will have our annual garlic mustard pull over at the Isinglass River Conservation Reserve (IRCR). The understory of our native plants including lady slipper, jack in the pulpit, trillium, partridgeberry, wintergreen and others continue to be threatened by this nonnative that uses the insidious technique of emitting chemicals into the soil that inhibit our natives. Each year we need to halt the garlic mustard's advance before it goes to seed. Luckily it is easy to pull. (3) By the time the snow is gone, we will have approval of the proposed trail route connecting the Spencer Smith trail across to Evans Mountain and will welcome help with trail making this year.

As March begins, chances are we'll still be in deep snow. If there is anyone who is still feeling a bit snowbound with snow in the back yard even too deep for snowshoeing, you may want to check out the Strafford Swamp Stompers' trail system. Two good places to access the trails for a snowshoe-less walk are behind the Isinglass Country Store, and down Mile Hill on Johnsonboro Road. If you are still up for snowshoeing, the trails of the IRCR are so popular there is usually a trail already broken in from the kiosk. Find the trail map for the IRCR and


