
#### **REBECCA RULE AT HILL LIBRARY!**

#### JOYCE ANDERSEN & HARVEY REID IN CONCERT

Northwood Congregational Church presents Joyce Andersen and Harvey Reid in concert on Sunday, November 19, from 4 to 6 pm. After 20 years as a fiddle sideman and singer-songwriter, playing in bluegrass, country, rock, Celtic, jazz and folk ensembles, Joyce Andersen has boldly created a new body of music and a new musical standard for the unaccompanied fiddle troubadour. A reviewer said her solo CD *SWERVE* will "forever alter your perception of the violin." Most recently she has been on a songwriting tear, and several choirs, including Voices from the Heart, are performing her uplifting songs.

Acoustic Guitar magazine called Harvey Reid "...one of the true treasures of American acoustic music," and one of his 32 recordings was the only album in the last 25 years to be selected in a list of Top 10 Folk CDs of all time. Guitar Player Magazine put him on their "desert island" CD list. He was the national fingerpicking champion and international autoharp winner, and Doc Watson took him to lunch to ask him how he played the 6-string banjo. Reid's songs have been recorded by dozens of artists, and after 35 years he is one of the most respected and versatile songwriters and acoustic players on the scene.

Andersen & Reid will play solo sets and perform together and will keep you on the edge of your seats with a special uplifting Sunday repertoire of old gospel songs, new spirituals, and any other songs they see fit to play that fit into the spirit of the day. Expect slide guitar, dazzling fiddle, razor-sharp duet harmonies, guitar instrumentals, down-home bluegrass, and some rousing sing-a-longs. Rep. Harrington is sponsoring a bill so you will see, on your monthly electricity bill, exactly how much more you pay to subsidize the "Green" energy sources in NH.

Rep. Wuelper thinks you should know what actually happens during contract negotiations and has a bill in to make those negotiating sessions open public meetings.

We couldn't avoid talking about potential "bump stock" bills. While opinions differed on such a bill's effectiveness, all agreed there is no reason for the House to suspend its rules to allow on this year because the Senate bill-filing period is still open; and any such bill could easily be introduced under the regular rules.

#### FROM THE TAX COLLECTOR'S OFICE

Purchase your Hunting and Fishing License and Register you OHRV at the Tax Collector's Office. To purchase your Hunting license, you need your expired Hunting license OR a copy of your "Hunter Safety Course Certificate" or "Archery Education Certificate."

Get your OHRVs, Dirt Bikes, Three or Four wheelers and Snowmobile Registration at the Tax Collector's Office. If you have not registered it in the past two years, you will need to know all the information about it (including the VIN #).

When registering your snowmobiles, Snowmobile club memberships will save you an extra fee. The Snowmobile club MUST be affiliated with the NH Snowmobile Association. Our local Strafford Swamp Stompers Snowmobile Club is affiliated. It is not mandatory to belong to a club, but it does save you money. Be sure to bring your Snowmobile membership number with you.

You can purchase licenses or registrations Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8:30 to 2 and Tuesday 1 to 6 or any time the Tax Collector is in the building.

#### HISTORICAL NOTES

The Strafford Historical Society is pleased to welcome the OreoBelles group for another set of great performances at the Old Waldron Store, 520 Province Road, on Saturday, November 11, and Sunday, November 12; proceeds to benefit the Historical Society for upkeep of our buildings.

Looking forward, the Old Waldron Store will again host a number of crafters for *Christmas in Strafford* on the first weekend in December and will host a Christmas program the following weekend—December 8, 9, and 10. We hope that you will join us for all of these special events.

Please note that due to scheduling conflicts the program planned for the Society's November meeting has been postponed to next spring, and there will be no regular membership meeting in November.



#### CONSERVATION COMMISSION NOTES

It is disconcerting to learn that the emerald ash borer (EAB) has been reported in both Strafford and Barnstead. This beetle, Agrilis Planipennis Fairemare, was first detected in Michigan in 2002. It has been known to infest all species of ash and has been responsible for the loss of millions of trees. The larvae of this insect bore into the ash tree where they feed on inner bark and phloem, creating "S" shaped galleries.

In addition to spreading naturally, the EAB is easily spread by moving firewood. Consequently, Strafford County issued a firewood quarantine on September 21, 2017. Major infestations may require drastic measures to contain EAB, including removal of thousands of trees. On the entry slope to our Town Forest are by count 43 ash trees. There is a story behind these trees. I recall working with another member of the Commission as part of a conservation program in the late 1970s. We were doing some selective cutting and left these trees as saplings. They have grown to maturity and are quite impressive. We will be discussing what to do with these at future meetings. Although they are not yet infested, it may be prudent to remove them before they become unsightly and hazardous due to EAB. However, there is evidence that leaving some ash trees may actually slow the spread of this pest. If you think you have found EAB, contact one of these offices: State Department of Agriculture, State Forestry or Natural Resource Agency, Cooperative Extension Office, U.S. Forest Service, or USDA Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service or call toll free 1-800-444-8978. #### SCHOOL BOARD NOTES

Collective Bargaining Fact Finding Update: As many of you are aware, the School Board and Strafford Education Association (SEA) were again unable to come to a contract agreement last spring. After going through a number of negotiation meetings and a mediation session, the SEA requested to go to Fact Finding. In this process, an independent agent is hired to review packages from both parties and make a ruling. The difference between this process and mediation is that the result of the fact finding has to be brought before the voters, even if one or both parties disagree with the decision. Both the Board and SEA submitted their fact finding briefs to the agent at the end of September, and both parties also submitted a reply brief within 14 days of the original submission. This allowed both parties to respond to anything they saw in the other party's submitted briefing. We are supposed to have a ruling from the Fact Finder within approximately 30 days of submission. Once a finding is released, both the SEA and Board have 10 days to review the result. The SEA and Board will then vote on whether or not they accept the finding. Again, the difference here is that even if the Board does not accept the finding, it is still brought before the voters in a warrant article. The Board does not expect to have to file for a Special Meeting with the NH Superior Court but instead bring it to the voters during the District Meeting next March (2018). #### STRAFFORD TOWN DEMOCRATS

On October 3 Erin Turmelle, the energetic Political Director with the New Hampshire Democratic Party, treated members to a surprisingly interesting presentation on NH voting statistics. The basics: Whether people vote in federal, state or municipal elections is public information. That information is posted at publicly accessible locations at all clerk's offices in the state. Information on the checklist includes voter's name, street address, mailing address, town or city, voter history for an election (including whether or not one voted absentee), and party affiliation, if any, of every registered voter in the town or city. How people vote, however, is not public. NH voter turnout in the 2016 election at 72.5 percent of the voter-eligible population of 1,042,102 was the highest in NH history at 755,580, a 5.2 percent increase from 2012, and compared to a 2006 turnout of 417,436. NH turnout was exceeded only by two other states, Minnesota at 74.8 percent, and Maine at 72.8. The importance of same-day voter registration is clear: The six states with the highest voter turnout allow same-day voter registration, resulting, on average, in a 7 - 13 percent increase over states having no same-day registration. Erin's power point then included a primer on social media, with an emphasis on Twitter as a valuable and popular source of political information and 140-character messaging.

Our Tuesday, November 7, meeting will feature an 81-minute HBO documentary entitled *Hacking Democracy*, which follows a tenacious Seattle grandmother, Bev Harris, and her band of extraordinary citizen-activists, as they set out to
