

CONSERVATION NOTES

One of the pleasant things about living in the country is the sounds of summer nights. It is not uncommon to hear coyotes howling or the barred owl hooting "Who cooks for you? Who cooks for you all?" Another intriguing noise you may hear at night if you live in a wooded area is what sounds like a weak bird chirp. The sound is not a bird but rather that of the southern flying squirrel. These nocturnal animals are seldom seen. At best you might catch a glimpse of one in your headlights as they glide from tree to tree.

If you get out on Bow Lake, you will see several loon chicks that are getting big but not as big as the eaglet on Bennett Island. The baby is nearly as big as the adults. Were it not for its brown, juvenile plumage, one could not tell the difference. The Conservation Commission remains a strong supporter of the Bennett Island Conservation Project.

As a follow up to last month's topic of junkyards, we would like to offer some guidance in the process of getting rid of unwanted vehicles. 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STATE HOUSE UPDATE

This is the latest in a series of updates from one of your State Representatives, Mike Harrington of Strafford, on what's happening in the NH State House.

The Legislature typically meets from January through June each of the two years of the session; meeting after June only in special sessions most commonly to address any Governor's vetoes. This year was the first year of the session, and the biggest issue is as always the budget. For the first time in many years, the House failed to pass a budget onto the Senate. The proposed budget, though backed by Republican leadership, was not supported by some Republicans who thought it spent too much and by almost all Democrats who thought it didn't spend enough. The Senate passed a slightly different budget and sent it to the House. The House passed this budget with most Republicans supporting it and most Democrats opposing it. It was then signed by the Governor. Among other things, the new budget reorganizes multiple departments in State government; the duties are the same but which department does what is different as are the new department names. Many new laws were passed, but here are a few that could directly affect Strafford residents.

All Day Kindergarten Funding: Strafford passed all-day kindergarten at this spring's School District Meeting. This new law will provide a minimum of \$1,100/student, but this could go as high as \$1,800 depending on the amount of revenue generated from Keno, which was legalized as part of this bill. (Be advised that even at the \$1,800/student level the actual cost will be much higher and the difference paid by local property tax payers.) Keno would still have to be voted in on a town-bytown basis and would only be allowed at establishments that have a license to "pour" liquor.

Marijuana Decriminalization: Possession of small amounts of Marijuana will no longer be a crime but a violation (similar to a speeding ticket). This does NOT make possession of marijuana legal! There is still a fine associated with possession of small amounts, and possession of larger amounts or sale or manufacture are still crimes. Also, possession of any amount is still illegal under Federal law. If you are drug tested by your employer who has Federal contracts, the new law in NH changes nothing.

Concealed Carry of Firearms: You no longer need a permit to carry a pistol concealed in NH provided you meet all other legal requirements to possess a pistol. In short, if it was legal for you to carry a pistol unconcealed under the old law, you can now carry one concealed. Of course, there are still many locations such as all Federal Buildings where no firearms are allowed. Carry permits can still be obtained, however, as these are required for those who wish to carry a pistol in other states that have reciprocity with NH. (Never make any assumptions on this; ALWAYS check with the State Police of the state you plan on visiting before you visit.)

Should you have questions on these or other State issues, please feel free to contact me. There will be a brief period in September where new proposed legislation can be filed. If you

END 68 HOURS OF HUNGER

End 68 Hours of Hunger provides food to the students in the schools in Strafford, Nottingham, and Northwood (including Coe-Brown) for the 68 hours from Friday afternoon until Monday morning when the students return to school. Many children receive breakfast and lunch at school Monday-Friday but do not have access to food over the weekends. Through donations, we collect and buy food and send it home every Friday with these children. The cost of food runs around \$10 per child per weekend. Our organization right now needs monthly food packers, weekly or biweekly food deliverers to the different schools, monetary and food donations, businesses to help bring in donations or assist with fundraisers. We have monetary donation cans at Heritage Hardware, Cavarretta Gardens, Liar's Paradise, and Isinglass stores; and checks can be mailed to "End 68 Hours of Hunger, Northwood, Nottingham, Strafford, and CBNA", 62 Knowles Way, Northwood, NH 03261. We have a few Northwood businesses, a church, and organizations who have been very generous to us over the last few years, and we are grateful for their assistance. We are hoping that other businesses and groups in all three towns will consider how they might help as well.

We are participating in a Dover Consignment Sale in September and can make some money by selling children's items at the sale. (Donations are needed before Labor Day.) OHRVs, FISHING & HUNTING LICENSES

Purchase your Hunting & Fishing License and register you OHRV at the Tax Collector's Office. To purchase your Hunting License, you need your expired Hunting License OR a copy of your "Hunter Safety Course Certificate".

Get your OHRVs, dirt bikes, three- or four- wheelers and snowmobile registration at the Tax Collector's Office. If you have not registered it in the past two years, you will need to know all the information about it (including the VIN #).

Snowmobile club membership will save you an extra fee. The snowmobile club MUST be affiliated with the NH Snowmobile Association. Our local Strafford Swamp Stompers Snowmobile Club is affiliated. It is not mandatory to belong to a club, but it does save you money.

You can purchase licenses and registrations on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday from 8:30 to 2, and on Tuesday from 1 to 6.

STEPHEN O'GRADY RECEIVES BOSTON POST CANE

On Tuesday, July 18, 2017, Stephen O'Grady became the proud recipient of Strafford's Boston Post Cane as the oldest resident of Strafford, NH at 101 years of age. The Cane was presented by JoAnn Brown, President of the Strafford Historical Society. Michael Harrington, Strafford's NH State Representative, presented a framed Citation from NH Governor Sununu. Also in attendance were Strafford Selectman Bryant Scott, and family, friends, and neighbors.

The Board of Selectmen are the trustees of the Cane. Strafford was one of 700 towns in New England to receive a gold-headed ebony cane from the publisher of the old *Boston Post* newspaper in order to honor the oldest living citizen of that town.

Mr. O'Grady is a healthy 101 year old and continues to mow the lawn and make repairs to the tractor. Steve was born on November 13, 1915 and raised in the "Whaling Capital of the World", New Bedford, MA. As a boy, three-masted ships were still combing the seas for the great whale. At the time, New Bedford was bustling with tool and dye manufacturers, cotton mills, and commercial fishing. It was one of the richest per capita cities in the World.

Steve served in the Army in World War II. At first, he was sent by President Roosevelt to help fight the American Union workers. He was one of 400 Military Policemen sent to Springfield, MA, to fend off strikes at the Springfield Arms Company. After the threat of strikes passed, Steve and his fellow soldiers were sent up to Aroostook County, Maine to help with the potato harvest. He was later trained as a Medic and sent to the Philippines in preparation for the invasion of Japan. However, the A-bomb made the invasion unnecessary.

After the War, Steve worked for the New Bedford School Department as a custodian in the same school his father had worked. Steve was a licensed steam boiler operator in charge of the school's large coal-fired boiler. Steve retired in 1978 and moved to the Kerivan farm in Strafford in 1980 with his brother, Francis O'Grady (1917-2002). Their sister, Rita M. Kerivan (1919-2017) joined them at the farm in 1996.

Steve shared what his very strict father told him—"If God had wanted me to smoke, he would have made me into a chimney." Steve never smoked and does not divulge his secret for longevity. One theory for his great health is attributed to diet—bacon and eggs for breakfast, fried bologna sandwiches for lunch, and meat and potatoes for supper, finished off with a Ring Ding or Twinkie. However, one must take into consideration his vice-free life, his "everything in moderation" attitude, work ethic, and a solid religious faith.
