HISTORY I NEVER KNEW: THE BOW LAKE LIGHTNING REGATTA

On June 27, Bow Lake experienced its first Lightning New England District Championships, which included 17 boats. I learned many things I never knew. Seventeen boats took part, and crews came from as far away as Rochester, NY. We housed a delightful crew of thirty-something sailors from Lake Champlain, VT, and I became very involved with the "whats?" and "whys?" of sailboat racing.

The morning of the race, "our" sailors said they slept well and that they always have a few jitters before a race. Their boat was built in 1983. They joined the race at Bow Lake to support the fleet here. Because the weather predictions were dire for the next day, the people in charge of the Regatta made the tough decision to do all 5 races in one day. Three of the 5 races went for 2 times around the course. Once around the markers took about 25 minutes, and the distance was approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Lightning, a 19-foot centerboard sloop, was originally designed by Sparkman & Stephens as an affordable family day-sailor and racing boat. She has evolved into one of the most popular and competitive one-design racing classes in the world. Awarded ISAF International Class status, the Lightning is sailed in more than 13 countries and in the Pan American Games, and the class provides a professionally-managed association that is among the largest in all of one-design sailing. The Lightning's rig is simple, but offers

sophisticated sail shape controls. The hull features a unique hard chine design that combines the stability that provides sail-carrying power, with flat bottom sections that promote planing. The International Lightning Class Association protects the boat's design and licenses custom and private builders to build boats under its administration. A list of Lightning builders is available from the ILCA upon request. There have been over 15,000 built, and there are over 500 fleets worldwide. (www.lightningclass.org)

There were 5 boats from Bow Lake in the race: 1) Ned Hinds, 2) Bob Shapiro, 3) Rob Donle, 4) Nathanial Henrickson, 5) Jamie and John Boynton. The Regatta was a true community event because many people pitched in to help, continue to protect the lake, and make it a safe event. For example, several people, including a Strafford Policeman, helped the long line of trailers at the boat ramp. The Lake Hosts on duty thoroughly checked all the sailboats and trailers for invasive milfoil. Clarinda and Bruce Donle helped with the race in one of the crash boats. They reported that there were some near misses but nothing serious. Dave Murdock told me that he and his brother used to go to Trinity Church Camp on Bow Lake, sailing on Sunflowers against Camp Idlepines. He reported at the celebration dinner on race day that all the crews really appreciated the Lake and the friendliness of Strafford people. Dave organized housing for 6 crews at 4 different houses. The crew from

Lake Champlain, which ultimately came in 1st place out of the 5 races, said they always love it at Bow Lake. "Our" crew came in 4th, which was admirable given that they had never raced on "our" Bow Lake before.

Another historic community event is the Lobster Cookout sponsored as a fundraiser by the Bow Lake Camp Owners Association. And, unlike the NE Lightning District Championship Regatta, this is not the first but actually the 55th Lobster Cookout! Join us on Saturday, August 8, from 5-7 pm at Whitchers Point on Water Street.




NH THUNDER CROSS COUNTRY PROGRAM





APPALACHIAN TRAIL PROGRAM HOSTED BY STRAFFORD WOMEN'S CLUB

Bette Frazier Thru-Hiked the 2,174 mile Appalachian Trail from Springer Mt, GA, to Katahdin, ME March 31 to August 27, 2007 after retiring from teaching children Physical Education for 25 years in NH. She was the 115th hiker to complete the Trail and the 14th woman in the 2007 season. She averaged over 15 miles per day for the 150-day journey (which included seven zero days). With a trail name of "Catchup", Bette caught up to hundreds of other hikers who helped her to have a safe, injury-free, life-changing experience. Carrying a 28 lb. backpack, eating dehydrated food, encountering rattlesnakes, bear and a bobcat, this was a very exciting adventure! She will show her equipment and slide show, representing her website at www.trailjournals.com/catchup. Bette's goal is to encourage youth and adults to experience the beauty of nature right here in our local area where hiking trails are readily available. She has completed hiking the NH forty-eight 4,000-footers, the 67 New England 4000-footers, the Long Trail and Belknap Ridge. She has 600 miles remaining to complete her section hike of the Appalachian Trail.

CONSERVATION NOTES

Conservation Commission members spent a recent Sunday morning on the popular Spencer Smith trail on the Town Forest looking at the problem of the wet area up a short rise from the trailhead off Parker Mountain Road. It is full of sphagnum moss and fed by a drainage down from the nearby rocky cliff. Though dry much of the summer and autumn that section can also be wet and mucky at any time of the year depending upon the weather. Until now the trail through the area has been maintained with wide planks, but many are now deteriorating. Rather than replacing those planks, rerouting the trail to avoid the whole bog area as much as possible seems the best solution. Conservation Commission members are working to create a new trail around the wet area that can cross the wet drainage in a much narrower area. The old boards will be gone, the new path will be clearly indicated, and brush piles in the wet area should discourage hikers from taking the old route.

The Spencer Smith trail is probably the trail most used by those of us in town as well as others from around the region. The Conservation Commission is thankful to Rick Hodges who keeps the parking area plowed in winter. Even on the bitterest winter days we will see cars parked there and footprints up the trail.

The other Town Forest trail is the Neil Mooers loop, a C-shaped trail that starts by the Town Forest sign, goes up the broad forest access road and near the top goes through the woods blazed in red and exits on the highway at a smaller parking area about halfway up the hill. A blue-blazed trail leads off the Neil Mooers loop and heads uphill to join the Spencer Smith trail. Find a map for the Town Forest trails on the Town of Strafford website. Click on Conservation Commission over under the list of Boards and Commissions and then scroll down to find both the Town Forest and Isinglass River Conservation Reserve trail map. Happy trails!

It's time for another Wildflower Identification Walk at Graylag Cabins on Wild Goose Pond. Botanist George Newman led a group to identify spring wildflowers earlier this year, and he will be back on Sunday, August 9, at noon to lead those interested in seeing the summer wildflowers. The walk is free and open to the public. Check www. graylagcabins.com for directions.
