#### PUBLIC BUDGET HEARING STRAFFORD SCHOOL DISTRICT



DOG LICENSES—A reminder that all dogs 4 months and older must be licensed each year between January 1 and April 30. See below for details on licensing your dogs online.

Online Vehicle Renewals & Dog Licensing—You can renew your vehicle registrations and license your dogs with the Strafford Town Clerk online. Just follow the instructions on the renewal letters we send OR go to www.strafford. nh.gov (our Town website) and locate the red "Online Payments" button. The Strafford Town Clerk will process your online renewals and mail your registrations/licenses to you. It's easy and convenient. Only renewals can be processed online; allow one week for processing; all new vehicles, vehicle transfers, and new dogs must continue to be processed in person at the Town Clerk's office.

The Town Hall (Including the Town Clerk's Office) will be closed on the following days in February & March: Tuesday, February 9, 2016–Presidential Primary VOTING ONLY; Monday, February 15, 2016–Presidents Day; Tuesday, March 8, 2016–Town Election Day VOTING ONLY.

2016 PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY – TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 9, 2016; Town offices will be open for *VOTING ONLY*.

TOWN ELECTION – TUESDAY, MARCH 8, 2016; to be held at the Strafford Town Hall on Tuesday, March 8, 2016. The polls will be open for voting from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

TOWN MEETING – SATURDAY, MARCH 12, 2016; to be held at the Strafford School Gym on Saturday, March 12, 2016 at 8:30 am.

Voter Registration for Town Election/Town Meeting/ Supervisors of the Checklist Session –

You may register to vote with the Strafford Town Clerk during regular business hours on or before Thursday, February 25, 2016. You may register to vote at the Supervisors of the Checklist session to be held on Saturday, February 27, 2016 from 11:00 to 11:30 am at the Strafford Town Hall (change of party will be accepted). If you have not registered to vote by February 27 and wish to vote at Town Election or Town Meeting, you may register at Town Election on March 8.

Please note that if you have not registered to vote by Election Day, March 8, you will not be eligible to vote at the annual School District Meeting or Town Meeting on Saturday, March 12.

# SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENT FROM THE TAX COLLECTOR

You can now purchase your Hunting and Fishing License at the Tax Collector's Office in the Strafford Town Hall. To purchase your Hunting license, you must provide your expired Hunting license or a copy of your "Hunter Safety Course Certificate." You must have this with you in order to receive your Hunting license.

You may also get your Off Highway Recreational Vehicle (OHRV) and Snowmobile Registration at the Tax Collector's Office. Remember to bring proof of your current Snowmobile Club Membership with you to save yourself the extra fee. The Snowmobile Club MUST be affiliated with the NH Snowmobile Association. Our local "Strafford Swamp Stompers Snowmobile Club" is affiliated. It is not mandatory to belong to a club, but it does save you money.

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
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#### STRAFFORD REPUBLICAN COMMITTEE

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

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# BECOMING WOLF: EASTERN COYOTE IN NEW ENGLAND

Please join us at Hill Library on Thursday, February 18, 2016 at 6:30 pm when Chris Schadler, MS, MA will present "Becoming Wolf: Eastern Coyote in New England". For more than 30 years, Chris has studied the wild members of the Canidae family, a biological group that includes coyotes, wolves, foxes, jackals and the domesticated dog. Chris' interest in wild canids began in 1980 as a volunteer at the Wolf Park in Battleground, Indiana under Dr. Erich Klinghammer. This opportunity and others inspired an eventual Masters in Conservation Biology at Antioch University Graduate School. Her thesis focused on the biological and social perspectives of natural recovery for the Eastern Timber Wolf in Michigan. While wolf recovery was the focus of her early work, Chris' attention shifted to the eastern coyote when she moved to New England. She chose a farm with known coyote problems to raise sheep and train her border collies. Using sound livestock management and common sense, she has avoided any predation for nearly two decades. A peaceful co-existence between coyote and livestock has grown an attentive audience for humane management.

Schadler described why she believes the coyote could soon claim the ecological niche once held by the wolf in the woods of northern New England. 'I have believed for 20 years this eastern coy-wolf we have is rapidly evolving into a top predator,' she said. As coyotes from western states migrated through Canada to New England, they bred with wolves, Schadler said. The resulting animal can grow to 45 pounds—nearly twice as large as western coyotes—and is beginning to hunt in packs. Like mosquitoes and crows, she said, coyotes are extremely opportunistic creatures: They eat everything from strawberries to garbage to freshly killed deer; they live so easily among humans that thousands have been counted in Chicago; and they respond when humans hunt them by bearing even more young. 'When we walk through the woods, they're there, watching us,' Schadler said.
