

STONE WALLS PROGRAM

Join Kevin Gardner, author of *The Granite Kiss*, at Hill Library on November 23 at 7 pm, as he discusses the history, technique, stylistic development and aesthetics of New England stone walls. Mr. Gardner will also explain the how and why New England came to acquire its thousands of miles of stone walls, the ways in which they and other dry stone structures were built, how their styles emerged and changed over time, and their significance to the famous New England landscape.

Along the way, Kevin occupies himself building a miniature wall or walls on a tabletop, using tiny stones from a fivegallon bucket. There will be a generous question-and-answer period, during which listeners are encouraged to bring up specific problems or projects on their own properties.

Since the publication of *The Granite Kiss*, Kevin has presented his program at dozens of historical societies, bookstores, and town libraries all over New England.

The program will be held on Monday, November 23, 2015 at 7 pm at Hill Library, 1151 Parker Mountain Road in Strafford. This program is made possible by a grant from the NH Humanities Council through its Humanities To Go program and is co-sponsored by the Friends of the Hill Library. NOTES FROM THE TOWN CLERK

Fall/Winter Town Hall closed schedule: Wednesday, November 11, 2015–Veteran's Day; Thursday, November 26, 2015–Thanksgiving Day; Thursday, December 24, 2015–Christmas Eve Day; Friday, December 25, 2015–Christmas Day; Thursday, December 31, 2015–New Year's Eve Day, closing at Noon.

On-Line Vehicle Renewals & Dog Licensing—You can renew your vehicle registrations and license your dogs with the Strafford Town Clerk online. Just follow the instructions on the renewal letters we send OR go to www.strafford. nh.gov (our Town website) and locate the red "Online Payments" button. The Strafford Town Clerk will process your online renewals and mail your registrations/licenses to you. It's easy and convenient. Only renewals can be processed on-line; dog licenses for 2016 can be processed online beginning January 1, 2016; allow one week for processing; all new vehicles, vehicle transfers, and new dogs must continue to be processed in person at the Town Clerk's office. Note: We continue to offer renewal services by mail or in person at the Town Clerk's office.

FROM THE U.S. POSTAL SERVICE, PLEASE KEEP WALKWAYS SAFE FOR LETTER CARRIERS

Leaves in an array of colors add a blanket of pre-winter beauty to the New England landscape. But what lies beneath those leaves can be treacherous. Holes, hoses, branches and toys can be camouflaged trip hazards around your home, and wet leaves can be as slippery as ice. That puts any visitor to your residence, including letter carriers, at risk. You can help protect visitors to your home by removing debris and leaves and promptly repairing broken stairs or walkways. Please keep your entryway free of items that can become hidden hazards, and make sure your downspouts are clear and direct water away from walkways.

To safely deliver, carriers need a clear path to your mailbox. Overhanging branches or leaf piles at boxes should be removed. Boxes that are improperly mounted, rusted, or won't close securely should be replaced, and house numbers on boxes should be visible. This is the time of year to address any mailbox issues before the snowfalls.

With Daylight Saving Time it will be getting dark earlier. Leaving a light on to illuminate any outdoor hazards will help your carrier to safely deliver your mail. As we approach the holiday season, thank you for your cooperation keeping your property safe while our letter carriers continue to provide the first class service you've come to expect.

STRAFFORD TOWN REPUBLICANS

October's Columbus Day Round Table Discussion of the Town of Strafford Republican Committee touched on the various Presidential candidates. Representative Kurt Wuelper, a member of the Judicial Committee, spoke about some of the bills now before this Committee. Kurt shared that one of the bills is an updating of the Criminal Forfeiture Law 636 which is currently such a mess that most goods seized from crime are handled through the Drug Law 318. We also discussed CACR5 which would allow New Hampshire Citizens the right to sue the State of New Hampshire. They will also hear a number of bills on aborting the lives of people in utero around the topics of late term, genetic abnormalities, and pain felt by the person in utero. The House Judicial Committee will also be looking at the Right to Know Laws which can be encumbered by unreasonable time and dollar requirements for production of copies of documents requested.

CONSERVATION NOTES

How about a good November walk before we need to do it with snowshoes? It's been a while since we wrote about the walk up to Little Niagara, a very picturesque Strafford waterfall. Does everyone know how to get there? Take First Crown Point Road way up over the high point, keep going past the parking lot for the Blue Job Mountain trail, another good walk, and continue on First Crown Point until you see Little Niagara Road on the left. Down Little Niagara Road past several houses you'll find a parking area by the big wetland. You'll have to walk the road beyond that point about a half mile to the falls on your left where the Big River tumbles into a ravine.

Or maybe you'd like to try the newly trimmed out and flagged Neil Mooers trail as it continues through the woods from near the top of the wide forest access road at the Town Forest. In late summer, Conservation Commission members and volunteers worked to bring the trail back to easy-tofollow shape.

Many have enjoyed the trails at the Isinglass River Conservation Reserve, and one of them extends into the Bedford Property that is part of the several tracts of land that make up the IRCR. That parcel begins right across from the Strafford Recycling Center, and its boundaries are now even more clearly defined thanks to work by Carolyn Page and Mimi Jost, who have spent time refreshing blazes and posting the Bear-Paw conservation easement signs. Find the IRCR trail map at the Conservation Commission portion of the Town website.

Our conservation lands are open for hunting, but that shouldn't stop hikers from enjoying them in November. Everyone, just wear that blaze orange and enjoy Strafford in autumn!

ANOTHER STRAFFORD CENTENARIAN

Stephen O'Grady is celebrating his 100th birthday at the Kerivan farm on Northwood Road on Friday, November 13, 2015. Mr. O'Grady is a healthy 100 year old as he continues to mow the lawn and make repairs to the tractor. He and his kid sister Rita, age 95, live at the farm. Steve was born and raised in the "Whaling Capital of the World," New Bedford, MA. As a boy, three-masted ships were still combing the seas for the great whale. At the time, New Bedford was bustling with tool and dye manufacturers, cotton mills, and commercial fishing. It was one of the richest per capita cities in the World.

Steve served in the Army in World War II. At first, he was sent by Roosevelt to help fight the American Union workers. He was one of 400 Military Policemen sent to Springfield, MA, to fend off strikes at the Springfield Arms Company. He was later trained as a Medic and sent to the Philippines in preparation for the invasion of Japan. Luckily, the A-bomb made the invasion unnecessary.

After the War, Steve worked for the New Bedford School Department as a custodian in the same school his father had worked. Steve was a licensed steam boiler operator in charge of the school's large coal-fired boiler. Steve retired in 1978 and moved to the farm in 1980 with his brother, Francis O'Grady.

Steve does not divulge his secret for longevity. One theory for his great health is attributed to diet—bacon and eggs for breakfast and meat and potatoes for supper. However, one must take into consideration his vice-free life, his "everything in moderation" attitude, and a solid religious faith.

This 5k is offered by Catamount Womenaid and designed to bring the community together and promote health and wellness while supporting the small Deerfieldbased nonprofit. The course is a cross country-type run on dirt, gravel, grass and a little pavement. "About 90% of the route is in open view of spectators and there's only a slight incline along with a decent downhill. The route tours the grounds without entering the events area. About the flattest course one can find in Deerfield and the first of its kind on the historic Deerfield Fairgrounds," says Julie DeCosta, Catamount 5k Planning Committee Member. Walkers and runners of all ages are encouraged to participate.

Online registration is available until 10/31/15 for \$22. Free fleece hats for the first 100 registrants. Race day registration for \$30 starts at 7am and the 5k begins at 9am.
