FIRE FIGHTERS ANNUAL DINNER



CATAMOUNT 5K: RUN AROUND THE FAIRGROUNDS


Enjoy the scenic, autumn beauty of New England's Oldest Family Fairgrounds at the Inaugural Catamount 5k at the Deerfield Fairgrounds on Sunday, November 1, 2015. This 5k is offered by Catamount Womenaid and designed to bring the community together and promote health and wellness while supporting the small Deerfieldbased nonprofit. The course is a cross country-type run on dirt, gravel, grass and a little pavement. "About 90% of the route is in open view of spectators and there's only a slight incline along with a decent downhill. The route tours the grounds without entering the events area. About the flattest course one can find in Deerfield and the first of its kind on the historic Deerfield Fairgrounds," says Julie DeCosta, Catamount 5k Planning Committee Member. Walkers and runners of all ages are encouraged to participate.

Online registration is available until 10/31/15 for \$22. Free fleece hats for the first 100 registrants. Race day



registration for \$30 starts at 7am and the 5k begins at 9am. Parking is close and easy, using a main gate at 34 Stage Road. Don't forget to set your clocks back-daylight saving time ends 11/1/15—makes coming to a morning race even easier. There will be an Emcee with music and announcements to start out the day and to motivate runners during the race. After crossing the finish line, there will be an assortment of donated baked goods and fruit and beverages. Grab your friends and family and register for this unique 5k. CONSERVATION NOTES

It's time for a celebration! Thanks to so many of you who contributed to the fundraising effort, the Brown Island Project is complete and was signed in September. It isn't just the two small islands that will be protected but also the 1000 feet of Bow Lake shoreline on the peninsula nearby that will never be developed. So many helped make this possible, and now we need to party from 1 to 3 pm on October 10, 2015. See separate Bear-Paw article for details.

Throughout the summer, Cheryl Mrozienski and other loon watchers kept an eye on the loon and eagle families that make Bow Lake their breeding home. Cheryl publishes updates about the successes in hatching and rearing the young. As of late August she reported the results so far for the four loon families on the Lake and the eagle family on Bennett Island. The Blueberry Island area loons and the Caswell Cove loons each hatched one chick, and both those chicks were still alive in late summer. There is sadder news farther down the lake-the Kooaukee-Trinity Point area loons hatched a chick but lost it, and the Bennett Island area loons hatched two chicks but lost one early in the summer and the second one later in the summer. On the other hand, the bald eagles had a good summer; they hatched two eaglets, and both had fledged by the end of summer. STRAFFORD TOWN REPUBLICANS

At our second Monday in September meeting we were joined by Frank Edelblut who is exploring a run for governor. Frank has a BS in Accounting from University of Rhode Island, a Masters in Theology from Holy Cross; became a CPA, worked for Price Waterhouse as a manager; launched, ran, then sold Control Solutions; is an Angel Investor; is a board member of Patrick Henry College and Transparency International; and launched a Wine Company in California. Frank has been married for 30 years and has 7 children. Frank started Control Solutions at his kitchen table during an economic downturn; and it eventually was an international company with thousands of people on staff.

Frank was lively in his approach to seeing challenges as opportunities. One instance is to realize that the high rate of elderly in New Hampshire can be harnessed with better estate and wealth transfer laws leading to good financial planning jobs. Also, Frank envisions transitioning New Hampshire to be a Medical Tourism spot with a vibrant high tech health care research/manufacturing, cutting edge treatments not available elsewhere, and "Right to Try" laws allowing patients at end stages to reach into the FDA pipeline for drugs not fully approved yet. Frank also sees our scenic scenery as a plus for this venture. Frank Edelblut is pleased that younger people are thinking twice about college with some obtaining two-year technical degrees and earning 60 to 75K annually right off the bat with much lower debt. Frank knows that with only a couple million people, we can be more nimble and stay ahead of the change curve.

One recent example of New Hampshire trying to hold off change in a bad way was restricting Uber transportation. Frank illustrated that the efforts to do nothing and keep the status quo, like ducking the state employee pension gap, are really sinking New Hampshire. Frank Edelblut looks forward to "going to the ball" and proactively, positively lead New Hampshire to a healthier situation. Ross Berry, the Executive Director of NHGOP, also joined us and shared various insights.

Our September meeting is already in the books. Topics discussed were mostly about equipment and trail maintenance plus upcoming events. Another hot topic was the upcoming changes in how you will be able to join a snowmobile club in NH. Starting January 1st, you will be able to join our snowmobile club online through a special website run by the New Hampshire Snowmobile Association. This is the first step in a process towards making OHRV registrations available online. In the future you will be able to have "one stop shopping" where you can join a Club AND register your sled(s) all online. Now it is encouraged but not required that you join a New Hampshire snowmobile club before you register your snowmobile. This is a win/win situation. While your membership dollars are going directly to a worthy club to help with equipment and grooming expenses, you, the member, also receive a \$30 per sled discount on your OHRV registration fees. Currently our membership dues are \$28 for the entire family, and that includes a one season subscription to the Sno-Traveler Newspaper and NHSA decals. After we receive your membership application, we'll be mailing you a membership voucher which contains the information for your OHRV discounts.

It's VERY important that the information we receive on your application is legible and contains a valid email address and the date of birth for the primary member/head of household so we can set up your account in the database. We will be sending out application forms in the mail to all of last year's members shortly. You can also join the Club at local businesses such as Rochester Sports Center in Barrington, Bickford's Sports Center in Epsom, Morrison's Cycle in Madbury, Dover Marine in Dover, and Log Cabin Hardware in Nottingham. We also hope to have blank applications at the Town Hall, Sheilah's Deli & Market, and the Isinglass Country Store for you to fill out at home and send in.

After January 1 you will be able to join online through a special website. The link will be on our own website www. straffordswampstompers.org at that time. Online fee will be \$35 plus a \$2 transaction fee. Right now you can beat the rush and save a few bucks by joining early.
